

### Dr. John Conley The Great Legacy of a Holiness Preacher

Dr. John W. Conley, 76, of Circleville, went to be with the Lord July 25, 2008. An Army veteran of the Korean War, he earned a bachelor's degree from Asbury College, a master's degree from St. Thomas University and the Doctor of Divinity from Asbury College. Dr. Conley additionally studied at Ohio University, West Virginia School of Graduate Studies, Asbury Seminary and the South Texas College of Law. He served as senior pastor in Camden, South Carolina; Morehead, Kentucky; and South Charleston, West Virginia. During his presidency at Gulf Coast Bible College in Houston, he was instrumental in relocating the institution to Oklahoma City where it became Mid-America Christian University. Dr. Conley will be remembered for his leadership as President of Ohio Christian University.

It was my distinct privilege to become acquainted with Dr. Conley while transitioning to the presidency at Ohio Christian University. Each time we conversed, I sensed his genuine love for the work of God. He truly gave of himself to others; the legacy of lifelong service to his King shines brightly among us.

Dr. Conley's spirit of giving is illustrated by his deep commitment to Christian education. He passionately believed students should be prepared to "handle God's Word carefully." Recently, I listened to three of his recorded sermons in which he emphasized how important it is to be prepared to "preach and teach the Word accurately." This he did well.

John Conley was also widely known for his eloquent holiness preaching. Listening to his sermons and hearing colleagues speak about his life combined to make an indelible impression of how clearly his words and his life were presentations of the doctrine of holy living. Dr. Conley was the best at proclaiming it. He believed in forgiveness of sins and that one's heart could be filled with the Spirit and made pure. It is entirely appropriate to describe this minister of the Gospel as a great holiness preacher.

Dr. Conley was also a great leader. One of the greatest legacies left for Ohio Christian University is evidenced through his capable leadership throughout the process of accreditation with the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association. He launched the Adult Education Program (AIM) in 1998 and later expanded to the campuses of Hocking College and Columbus State Community College. Through these extended educational opportunities, college enrollment grew to record numbers as recognized through OCU receiving *Christianity Today* and the Association for Biblical Higher Education's growth award in 2001 and again in 2005.

Thus we honor the memory of John Conley, a man who unselfishly served others during his earthly sojourn and now enjoys his eternal reward in Heaven. Truly he *fought a good fight, finished his course and has received his crown of righteousness.* So, as I reflect, I leave with you this question. Who will replace John Conley? Are you willing to be one of the 1,000 leaders God is calling OCU to prepare?



# OCU CELEBRATES ANOTHER RECORD

The chapel and residence halls are bursting at the seams! OCU achieved a record enrollment of 780 students, which is 140 more than last year, a 22 percent increase.



# ENROLLMENT

Over the last two years, enrollment has increased by 274, a 54 percent increase. This phenomenal growth is attributed to new program offerings such as Logistics Management, associate degrees through evening classes, online delivery of degree programs, and new off-site campus locations in Dublin and Lancaster. Next year, OCU plans to offer evening classes in Chillicothe, Dover, and Nelsonville. These initiatives are part of OCU's strategic plan to reach 1,000 students by fall 2011. God is truly blessing the efforts of OCU's dedicated faculty, staff, and administrators.

Of the 780 current students, 326 are in the traditional program, while 344 are taking evening classes, and 110 are in the online program. Both the evening and online programs are designed to help busy adults finish their degrees in minimum time with maximum convenience. A new residence hall was constructed last year to accommodate growth and another will soon be needed. At last year's annual Association for Biblical Higher Education Conference, OCU won the enrollment growth award and hopes to win again this year.

Teacher education has been offered for a number of years at OCU; now full certification of this program is being sought and is expected to be received next year. OCU recently signed an agreement with Ohio University-Lancaster to jointly offer a Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies and Associate of Science in Nursing. The nursing classes will be held at Berger Hospital and other classes at OCU.

For church leaders, OCU has obtained approval to offer four master's courses. The first class, Pastoral Care Giver, scheduled for February 2-7, 2009, will be taught by Dr. Jim Smith, who is an OCU professor, ordained minister, and licensed counselor. OCU is seeking approval to offer the entire Master's of Arts in Ministry in conjunction with Wesley Biblical Seminary. Additionally, President Smith recently taught the two-day Church Planting Institute class, Leadership in Church Planting. The next such class is Planting Emerging Churches, scheduled for February 18-19, 2009, which will be taught by Dr. Bob Whitesel, author of five books.

# OCU & WESLEY BIBLICAL SEMINARY OFFER MASTER'S COURSES IN OHIO

Wesley Biblical Seminary, an Association of Theological Schools (ATS) accredited institution, and Ohio Christian University have entered into a partnership to provide additional Master's level education opportunities for Ohio residents.


The course offerings will allow students to study in the areas of Pastoral Ministries and Counseling. Students who take the courses will be able to earn credit toward a Wesley Biblical Seminary Degree. The courses will be offered in a highly concentrated, one-week format on the Ohio Christian University campus in order to most effectively serve practicing ministers and lay leaders. There will also be opportunities in the future for online courses. The first course, Pastoral Care Giver, will be offered February 2-7, 2009 and will be taught by Dr. Jim Smith, OCU professor, ordained minister, and licensed counselor.

Ohio Christian University and Wesley Biblical Seminary began discussions about seminary education several months ago and developed a plan to serve students in the Midwest by giving opportunities with regard to ministry.

Ohio Christian University President Mark A. Smith said, "This is one of the most exciting announcements of my Presidency for three reasons. First, this addresses a problem for one of the highest need areas of our nation-trained clergy. The U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Outlook Handbook indicates that there will be many jobs in the areas of ministry in the near future. All denominations are concerned about the shortage of clergy. Second, this is the first master's level offering for Ohio Christian University. Third, this means more growth for the University and more jobs for the Ohio region and Pickaway County.

President Ron Smith said, "I am pleased to announce our formal partnership with Ohio Christian University. Together we will undertake to offer serious graduate education to leaders who serve our churches, communities, nation and world. The soul of the Church is in the thought life of its people. Together we will work to train a generation of Christian thinkers who, as people that serve, will in turn put fiber into the soul of our nation."

October 27-28
brought the autumn
session of the
Maxwell Church
Planting Institute to
the OCU campus.

More than 30 church leaders and students from different denominations came together to hear Dr. Mark Smith, President of OCU, provide insightful teaching on how to maximize the potential of an organization through purposeful leadership. This is an area of considerable expertise for Dr. Smith who coauthored the book, *Leading Change in Your World*.

Institute sessions covered such areas as "Strategic Planning," "Marketing the Church," "Team Building," and "Church Growth." Dr. Smith offered both statistical data and anecdotal evidence from his experiences as a pastor and university president in his presentations. The institute participants were rigorously engaged not only by the excellent teaching, but also through peer interaction during the group-learning sessions.

OCU's next scheduled Institute is set for February 18-19, 2009, with Dr. Bob Whitesel, Associate Professor of Religion in the College of Graduate Studies at Indiana Wesleyan University. Dr. Whitesel will be teaching on the impact emerging churches are having on the next generation of church planters. Dr. Whitesel is the author of five books including *Inside the Organic Church*, published by Abingdon in 2006.

#### **Coach Josh Murton**

This fall has been a whirlwind of success for the men's soccer program. With new coach, Josh Murton, and a new energy, the men broke school records in wins (10), goals scored in a season (45), and goal differential in a season (+9). The men had a six-game winning streak, setting a new record for consecutive wins. The team was 10-2-1 and poised for a solid post-season, but injuries riddled the team as four starters sat out at one point in time. They finished the historic season 10-5-1 and moved into the off-season with youth and energy with 8 freshmen, 4 sophomores, 2 juniors, and 2 seniors.

Along with the team records, the men's soccer team also set many new individual records. Emanuel Harris (Fr.) was the first athlete in OCU history to be honored with Player of the Week in the NCCAA. He was not only honored in week one of the season, but also week three in the season. Harris also broke school records in goals scored in a season (21), assists (9) and points\* (51). He finished the season third in the nation in scoring. All the records are great, but the prize of the season is the title, "Mid-East Region Regular Season Champions," another first for OCU soccer.

The Regional Awards came with the successes. OCU's first team players in

the Mid-East Region were Emanuel Harris (Fr.), Dexter Chapman (Fr.) and Kevin Street (So.). The players named to the second team were Dominic Lehman (Sr.), Jimmy Galvan (Fr.) and Steve Vogelgesang (Fr.). "I am so pleased that we got the respect this team deserved. The young men have worked hard on the field and have been working hard on their faith," mentioned Coach Murton on his players' awards.

Above the awards is how this group of young men came together and put their focus on God and had Him in their forefront. "The great thing about these guys is that they are all learning. We had testimonies before each game, spent time in prayer and fellowshipped in our discussion about God. We all could take note from these young men that we never stop learning. I was impressed with how they practiced their spirituality by learning about the Lord's Word. I will be forever grateful for what God has taught me through them," added Coach Murton.

### **Lady Blazers Finish Strong**

The women's volleyball team started off this season knowing that this year was going to be different. With setter Whitney Pontius and libero Richelle Stewart having graduated, the team had two positions that needed to be filled. Freshman Kristen Uetrecht who brings six years of club and four years of high school volleyball experience stepped into the setter's role and ran a very aggressive offense for the Lady Trailblazers. Standing 5'11", she is able to keep the opponent guessing as to whether she will set up a teammate or attack the ball. Senior Leslie Turner transitioned from her previous position as a right side attacker to fill the libero void, and her 90% serve

receive average helped establish the Trailblazer's offense throughout the season.

With the transitions, OCU got off to a slow start with a record of 2-6. The turning point in the season was the first regional match versus Cincinnati Christian where the Lady Trailblazers lost in four sets. The team had an informal meeting and reflected on adjustments that needed to be made so the team could function at its very best during the remainder of the season. From that match forward, Ohio Christian won 17 of 21 matches. The team's focus throughout the year was being humble, improving weaknesses, and refining strengths.

The turnaround was a team effort. At the end of Week 3, Ohio Christian University was ranked 21<sup>st</sup> in the nation. The Lady Trailblazers rose to 11<sup>th</sup> in the nation by Week 6. The team's improved serve receive and defense helped a few players inch up in the national rankings for individual statistical leaders. Freshman Kristen Uetrecht steadily climbed through the rankings each week and ended the season ranked in the top 20. Senior Marlaina Shotsky and Sophomore Marissa Tackett were both ranked in the top 15 in the nation for attack percentage and kill average per set. After defeating regional opponents Kentucky Christian University, Crown College and Johnson Bible College, Shotsky received NCCAA Division II Student Athlete of the Week.

Going into the NCCAA MidEast Regional Tournament, the Lady Trailblazers were seeded third. Ohio Christian won its pool on Friday beating the host team Appalachian Bible College. Friday night pitted the 2nd seeded Eagles of Cincinnati Christian University versus OCU. Ohio Christian lost the first two sets, but fought back and pulled out the next 3 sets to win the match.

In the semi-finals, Ohio Christian made quick work of Johnson Bible College beating them in three straight sets. This set up the 3rd straight championship match between Kentucky Christian University and Ohio Christian University. "Although we came up short in the championship match, the team gave its very best." Said Coach Brothers, "Our goal is give glory to Christ by doing our very best and I know He is pleased with the team's excellent performance this year!"

The Ohio Christian University Women's Volleyball Team ended the 2008 season with an overall record of 19-10 and a regional record of 12-4. Senior Marlaina Shotsky was selected for the MidEast Regional Team and made the 2nd Team NCCAA All American squad. Sophomore Marissa Tackett received several honors by being chosen for the MidEast Regional Team, the All Tournament Team, and as a NCCAA All American Honorable Mention player. Senior Leslie Turner and Freshman Kristen Uetrecht were selected for Honorable Mention in the MidEast Region. Shotsky and Turner were also awarded their 2nd NCCAA Division II Scholar Athlete awards for earning a 3.5 GPA or higher.

# THE TOLER BROTHERS COME BACK HOME TO OCU

These accomplished ministers, authors, musicians, and OCU graduates are making a difference in their world.

Terry Toler, Stan Toler, and Mark Hollingsworth are building a wonderful family legacy. The three brothers are graduates of Ohio Christian University (then Circleville Bible College) and have gone on to achieve a variety of noteworthy accomplishments. Separately, Stan, Mark, and Terry are authors, pastors and leaders in their communities. Together, they are known as the "Toler Brothers Trio."

Raised in one of the poorest counties in America, the Toler Brothers didn't even have a radio in their home. Their entertainment was singing around an old upright piano in the living room of their home in West Virginia. The southern gospel harmony born in that humble beginning has provided the background for a combined sixty years of worldwide ministries that have touched literally millions of lives. The brothers blend gifted voices with the experience that helped them rise above childhood adversities, including the loss of their father in a construction accident and the loss of their home in a fire.

Dr. Terry Toler has been a contributing writer on three Grammy Award winning recordings, a certified platinum album, and multi-platinum videos. Terry's songs for children have been translated into many languages and are marketed internationally. His gospel songs have been recorded by some of the best-known names in Christian music. Dr. Toler also serves as Vice President for University Advancement and Church Relations at Southern Nazarene University. In addition to Ohio Christian University, he has earned degrees at Southern Nazarene University and the University of Sarasota.

Mark is actively involved in his community. He serves as treasurer for the Hope Center, which helps those who need clothing, food, and medical care. He also serves as chaplain to the Edmond Police department and was formerly president of The Edmond Ministerial Alliance. Mark is a trustee for Southern Nazarene University and advisory board member for the Northwest Oklahoma District in the Church of the Nazarene.

# Alumni Focus REV. JOE BOYSEL MINISTERS IN SCOTLAND


Joe Boysel, OCU Alumnus and Assistant Professor of Bible and Preaching, had a unique opportunity to represent Ohio Christian University this past summer when he traveled to Scotland as a visiting preacher for the congregation of the Trinity Church of the Nazarene in Perth.

Trinity Church has been without a pastor for a number of years—a situation that, sadly, is not uncommon in the United Kingdom among churches of all denominations. With fewer and fewer people pursuing ordained ministry each year in the UK, the pool of candidates is quickly drying up. In fact, in order to meet the leadership needs of the Trinity Church, the church board has implemented a varied array of creative solutions. Weekly preaching, however, has been the most difficult need to fill and is thus often divided between lay people, retired ministers, and visiting preachers. Amazingly, however, Trinity Church has grown over this period of pastoral transition to the point where it has become the second largest Nazarene Church in the country!

Professor Boysel's ministry at Trinity Church was to serve as both visiting preacher as well as to offer pastoral care. Consequently, besides preaching the Sunday services he also led Bible studies and prayer meetings in addition to visiting people in the hospitals and in their homes. Prof. Boysel said that in

his spare time he looked for opportunities to "recruit young people to 'cross the pond' and come to OCU!"

Prof. Boysel noted that "Scotland was beautiful, the people were lovely, and the need for sanctified, spirit-filled, well-trained leaders is enormous." He also said that there is, "a great opportunity for OCU graduates in all vocations to serve the Lord in Great Britain [because] in a land once famous for its Celtic missionaries and Protestant Reformers, the number of people attending church on Sunday now stands at less than 2 in 10."

# SILVIA LUCASCHI-DECKER

s the Director of AIM Recruitment and Enrollment Ohio Christian University, Silvia Lucaschi-Decker supervises individuals who recruit students for the adult program (called AIM). She is also responsible for AIM's marketing program and personally recruits students for the online associate degrees. She does all this from her home in Portage, Michigan. AIM programs consist of a B.A. in Leadership and Ministry, Business Management, Logistics Management, Psychology, and Substance Abuse Counseling, and an A.A. in Christian Ministry and Business Management.

Silvia came to OCU with an impressive resume. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Economics and Master in Business Administration, both from Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion, Indiana. She brought experience to OCU as a financial aid counselor and student recruiter. When presented with the opportunity to duplicate her recruiting success at OCU, Silvia accepted the challenge and now, two years later, is certain she made the right decision. She says, "I know I made the right decision. I have been challenged and stretched, but have grown so much. I am very thankful to be working with such great people." Silvia feels she has found her niche in higher education. We think so too. Since her arrival in 2006, enrollment in AIM programs has grown 275% and is now at 475 students.

If her academic credentials and experience are not impressive enough, Silvia has a rich heritage. She was born and raised in Bucharest, Romania, where she lived her first 18 years. Silvia's parents, having experienced the effects of Communism first hand, instilled in her a strong work ethic and a desire for constant self-improvement. Silvia describes her mother as "the epitome of unconditional love, self sacrifice, and hard work." Her parents provided the opportunity to study German, English, Russian, French and Latin, both in school and with private tutors. She was also involved in several extracurricular activities including figure skating, painting, gymnastics and tennis. Silvia won two regional figure skating awards and had several of her paintings on exhibit. She continues to skate today.

Her formative years coincided with a crucial period in Romania's history, transitioning from a planned economy to that of a free market economy. This transition and the deplorable state of Romania's economy after Communism intrigued her, and Silvia decided to study economics. She attributes her fascination with economics to her mother, who is also an economist, and her own desire to learn how to fix the state of the Romanian economy.

Silvia has been married to Matthew Decker, a doctoral candidate at Western Michigan University, for six years. They have a one year

old son, Alex. She is thoroughly enjoying discovering the world through her son's eyes. Her hobbies include reading, ice skating, Pilates exercise, and Sudokus.
