The Future of Higher Education

OCU's Executive Vice President Takes on a New Role as Provost to Lead OCU into 21st Century Technology

OCU will:

- Differ blended/hybrid education using technology to better serve our students, enhance their learning, increase classroom use efficiency, and thus improve our cost effectiveness.
- Description of the classes to traditional students.
- Serve high school students by offering classes online, on site, and on campus.
- Develop year-round educational programming for traditional students.
- Offer additional graduatelevel programs to serve the church and society.
- Increase student retention through remediation and other methods.
- Develop new educational models such as a three-year bachelor's program.
- Amplify OCU's impact by growing enrollment in traditional, adult, and online programs.

In the latter part of the 20th Century. Student enrollment soared, and the range of ages and ethnicities participating in higher education significantly increased. Technology allowed easy access to a rapidly increasing volume of knowledge and enabled teaching techniques not considered before. Higher education became increasingly designed to prepare graduates for a vocation, rather than giving them a broad education. At the same time, most new jobs being created require higher education. Many high school graduates are not adequately prepared for college and require remediation courses to succeed. This article will provide details on these trends experienced in higher education and how they are impacting Ohio Christian University.

Enrollment

Until the end of World War II, education was primarily reserved for the elite. After World War II, the masses started attending college, and enrollment has grown from 1.7 million in 1940 to 20.4 million now,¹ and is available to almost everyone in America. The student population has become more ethnically diverse as the U.S. population has become more diverse. For example, in 1976 caucasians represented 83 percent of the higher education student population; in 2009 this figure dropped to 62.3 percent,¹ which is comparable with caucasians being 64 percent of the U.S. population.² This trend will continue, and it is projected that caucasians will no longer make up the majority of the U.S. population by 2050, but will remain the largest single race.²

The age of college students is increasing, with many individuals going back to school for retraining, job-hopping, career-hopping, or self-improvement. In fact, traditional-age college students (23 or younger) comprise only 60 percent of undergraduate students.³

Ohio Christian University is providing a broad education and workforce readiness with a Christian worldview.

More individuals need education throughout their lives, especially with the emergence of a global and highly competitive knowledge-based economy that requires workers with education and training beyond high school. The U.S. government projects that nearly 8 out of 10 new jobs will require some sort of higher education, including workforce training.4 Thus there is also an increasing demand for non-degree educational forms (e.g., continuing education, training, certificate courses, and corporate training). OCU provides convenient education opportunities to busy adults through its AIM program, and the ethnic diversity has increased to 30 percent of OCU's total student population.



Technology as a Teaching Tool

The majority of today's traditional-age college students have grown up with technology, using it every day for communication, connection, entertainment, learning, or work. Americans have instant access to a vast array and volume of digital information—from anywhere, on any device they choose, at any time, in their preferred medium (audio, video, animation, or text).5 Therefore, the number of books in the library is less critical. Even small institutions have access to a large supply of resources available online such as books, journals, newspapers, data, music, and artifacts. Through OhioLINK, OCU faculty and students have access to 15 million scholarly articles and 70,000 e-books.

Students can now explore, interact, and solve problems through technological means not previously available. Similarly, teaching techniques not previously considered are available. At the same time, today's students, accustomed to brief sight and sound bits, have difficulty concentrating on 50-minute lectures.

Enrollment in online education has increased faster than overall higher education enrollments. Nearly 30 percent of higher education students (5.6 million) took at least one online class during fall 2009, which was 21 percent increase over the previous year.6 Ohio Christian University has been offering online education since 2007, and nearly 1,000 OCU students (40 percent of its total enrollment) are completely online students. Almost all institutions offer some online education, and most that do not are very small institutions that represent a small proportion of overall higher education enrollments.

Much research has been conducted on the effectiveness of online education, and students in online classes generally perform slightly better than those in face-to-face classes.⁷ However, research also indicates that blended or hybrid learning, combining online and face-to-face education, produces more learning than completely online

or completely face-to-face education.⁷ In these courses, substantial proportion of the content is delivered online, typically uses online discussion, and typically has a reduced number of face-to-face meetings.⁶ The focus is more on learning than on teaching. OCU is beginning to take advantage of this powerful learning method.

Professional vs. Broad Education

The bachelor's degree is the new high school diploma, and the master's degree is the new bachelor's degree. In 1940 less than 5 percent of Americans 25 and older had bachelor's degree; now nearly 28 percent do.8 The master's is the fastest-growing degree. In 2009 657,000 were awarded, which is more than double the number of master's degrees awarded in 1980.8 Nearly two in twenty-five people age 25 and over have a master's degree; about the same proportion that had a bachelor's or higher in 1960.8 We can expect to see more degrees designed specifically to meet workforce needs. To successfully prepare students for the job market, higher education must obtain input from employers and then design programs to meet these needs. Not everyone sees this trend as positive, citing it as a shift from intellectual pursuit to skill-based "ticket-to-a-vocation." However, some believe as this author that a college education can and should provide both work-force readiness and a broad education. OCU provides both, and includes Bible and theology as well!



Underprepared Students

Most high school students do not take a curriculum that prepares them for college. Many do not even graduate from high school.9 The U.S. high school graduation rate is only 75 percent.1 About 40 percent of all college students end up taking at least one remedial course.¹⁰ Additionally, the industry spends significant financial resources on remediation and retraining. In order for these underprepared students to succeed in college, institutions of higher education will need to help them learn basic reading, writing, and arithmetic skills. The alternates are unacceptable: flunking these students or allowing them to graduate without these skills. OCU provides student tutors, a full-time academic coach, and remedial courses to assist students. Some schools want to be exclusive and will not enroll these underprepared students. Ohio Christian University wants its Christian education to be available to anyone who is willing to work hard and follow its standards of conduct.

New Graduate Degrees Approved

MBA and MM approved by Ohio Board of Regents

Ohio Christian University is preparing to offer graduate business education through two new programs: the Master of Business Administration (MBA) and the Master of Management (MM). These programs are aligned well with OCU's mission as they will prepare students to serve as leaders in for-profit ventures, in non-profit organizations, and in their communities. The curricula prepare students to lead with integrity with strong ethical foundations.

These two programs have been created to address many requests from current students, alumni, and community members to offer graduate business education options. The University reviewed the curricula of many other institutions and sought advice from business people, including the Business Advisory Council,

in the design process. One of the members of this council, Bob Barber, CEO of Christian Investment Services, said, "I see a great need for students today with a biblical worldview of business principles. By offering an MBA program from a biblical worldview, OCU would put itself in a unique position that the surrounding competition cannot offer and could help its graduates change the moral decline of corporations in America and around the world."

Both programs are focused on practitioners and require 36 credits (12 courses) in about two years to complete all coursework in a lock-step, one-course-a-time cohort model used in OCU's adult programs. The MBA will provide the leaders of today and tomorrow with the knowledge and skills required to succeed in a competitive business environment. The MM will prepare professionals who want to enhance their managerial career paths in a variety of profit or not-for-profit organizations. Both programs will emphasize critical and strategic thinking, the Christian worldview, and real-world application of management principles.

The Ohio Board of Regents conducted a site visit in June 2011 to review these proposed programs. The team report was excellent, and OBR granted full approval to begin. The proposed programs are being evaluated by the Higher Learning Commission, and we hope to begin our first cohorts in January 2012. These programs will be available online or onsite in Circleville and Dublin.




Additionally, students from the church and surrounding community will be most welcome to join these adult education cohort programs delivered through the OCU AIM Department. Beginning this

Congressman Austria Attends Student Center Groundbreaking Ceremony August 15th

Ohio Christian University (OCU) broke ground for its new student center August 15, 2011 as community leaders and dignitaries vowed to improve the educational status of Pickaway County. The \$5 million, 30,000 square foot edifice is scheduled to open in December 2012 and initially will include a cafeteria, cafe, bookstore, intramural gymnasium and offices.

Classrooms, offices and a banquet hall on the second floor will be completed at a later date, according to Hank Kelly, university Provost. OCU has seen its on-campus and Online enrollment grow from 400 to 2,300 students in a relatively short period of time, and thousands of area residents also come to the Lancaster Pike facility annually for a variety of meetings, shows and athletic events, he said.

"This building is part of a threephase project we first started in 2006," Kelly said. "The student center will connect to the Maxwell



Center, which was completed in 2007, and the Science and Logistics Center we opened one year ago."

U.S. Rep. Steve Austria (R-Beavercreek) said the university's presence is an integral part of Pickaway County by helping grow the local economy, attract new businesses and create jobs that properlyeducated individuals can fill. "As we work in Washington to turn around the economy, our universities provide the education that's needed to prepare students to go into the workforce," Austria said.

Ula Jean Metzler, Pickaway County commissioner, told the crowd of about 100 people that the 2000 U.S. Census figures paint a dismal picture about residents' education achievements. "Pickaway County has lost jobs in the past because of the lack of a highly-educated workforce," she said. "People over the age of 25 who have

bachelor's degrees account for only 11.4 percent of our county's population. That's well below state (21.1 percent) and national (24.4 percent) levels."

Dr. Mark Smith, OCU president, said, "We must get (the county's) number up to 20 percent. It's not an option. I see a bright future for this area as the university moves forward."

OCU has made a strong effort in developing academic programs that target the county's educational needs, according to Ryan Scribner, economic development director for the Pickaway Progress Partnership.

"For people who drive by the campus on U.S. Route 22, it's easy to realize something special is going on at OCU," he said. "They see a vibrant, growing university that is committed to the county and connects with community leaders to promote economic development."



Traditional Undergraduate and Post-Secondary Program

Enrollment Reaches 600

s the Fall 2011 semester begins, we are grateful for the continued growth Ohio Christian experiences. Drama Team

Over the last year, the Ohio Christian University Drama Team has traveled to minister to youth groups and congregations at more than 35 off-campus events. They've visited youth services, church services, youth conventions, youth retreats, and Christian high schools presenting their visual ministry of skits, human videos (messages acted out to song) and testimonies to hundreds. On campus, they performed at more than 10 events including the Junior High Lock-In, Café Night, and chapels for OCU students and visitors.

The Drama Team is a student-led ministry with the mission to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ through the arts and introduce a Christ-centered university. The group consisted of 18 total students and was led by current senior, Jonathan Faulks.

In describing the ministry Faulks said, "It changes lives through live action movements that touch a wide variety of emotions. Using music allows us to connect with students in a way they can understand and relate to."

As a new school year begins, the team will be holding auditions and preparing for another year of traveling ministry with the theme of "Rooted in Love." One of the first events of the semester will be a multi-church youth drama workshop planned with the Bowen House in Logan, Ohio.

Camp Out for the Kingdom

This summer Ohio Christian University sent 35 students to 25 different camps. Our students attended camps in Ohio, Alabama, Georgia, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Indiana. Camp Team ministry can be a very rewarding but exhausting endeavor. The ministries our students participated in changed the lives of teens as well as their own. OCU student Monica Taylor said, "One of the best experiences I had all summer was seeing the week-long progression of a distant girl affected by past hurts become a girl who was willing to love and be loved. This was only because of the powerful love of God that changes hearts! Being a part of camp teams helped shape my future ministry because I saw first-hand what Christ can do in the lives of teens."

Camp team members worked alongside directors and other volunteers. One camp director said, "The team

was great; they knew when to have fun but when to be serious. Our camp was truly blessed by the work these five Godly people did. I wouldn't change it for the world, due to the leadership of the team!" The camp team members would all say they benefitted from their summer camp experience. We finished the summer strong and are looking forward to next year.

Trailblazer Academy

Ohio Christian University's Post-Secondary Enrollment Option (PSEO) Program, the Trailblazer Academy, continues to serve students throughout the state and community. Through Trailblazer Academy, high school students have the opportunity to take college courses, which enables them to complete high school required courses as well as college general education

courses before officially entering college. With a projected 190 participating students from more than 35 public schools, 12 Christian schools, and a growing homeschool group, Trailblazer Academy continues to be blessed.

Students participating in Trailblazer Academy are ambitious and dedicated students who are active in their high schools and the community. Their reasons for entering the PSEO program are numerous.

Some desire to begin their college career early while others are simply looking for more options than their high schools offer. The flexible program allows some students to choose a full schedule of college courses while others take only one or two courses.

Students may attend classes on the university campus, online, or through dual enrollment at participating high schools. As the program grows, we continue to expand our course offerings and online options. We have expanded offerings from four to seven online courses each semester and added new courses such as Introduction to Photography, Principles of Marketing, and Cultural Anthropology.

With this growing population at OCU, professors have commented on these dedicated students in the classroom. They appreciate how PSEO students, many of whom come from different cultures and faith backgrounds, bring new discussions to the table.

Dr. Sylvia McDonald, Assistant Professor of Social Sciences said, "I appreciate their devotion to academics as well as their contributions to classroom discussions. The Circleville community is very well represented by these fine students."

Many of these students continue their college careers at OCU. Others proceed to colleges in Ohio and surrounding states. Students who continue at other colleges often pursue studies in science, engineering and other programs not yet available at Ohio Christian University. Many students have reflected on how OCU's campus community has impacted their lives and shaped their first college experiences.





the first OCU Study Abroad program to Rome, Italy. He oversaw trips with students to New York City, where they visited the New York Stock Exchange, and to Washington D.C. where they met with congressional leaders.

As a longtime Texan, Dr. Garrison was taught the values of hard work, education and getting the most out of every dollar, principles that he has shared both in and out of the classroom. It is because of these principles that Dr. Garrison leaves his position at OCU to pursue a U.S. Congressional seat from Texas District 25. Spurred by his concern for the country's future, in July he announced his candidacy for the 2012 Republican nomination for Congress in Texas District 25.

"In July, my wife Rachel and I were blessed with our 15th grandchild, a boy. I can no longer sit on the sidelines while Washington D.C. refuses to take the necessary steps to save our country, so that my grandson can live the American dream. Through hard work, I have been able to accomplish many things in my business career and personal life that now gives me the time, ability and desire to serve the people of District 25."

Dr. Garrison will still play an important role at Ohio Christian University, serving as a consultant from Texas with planned trips to OCU each year. He will continue to teach in a blended format of online/onsite classes until elected. He will continue to lead trips for the University to places like Wall Street and Washington DC, and will also lead the newly formed Government Relations major.

In making this change Dr. Garrison says, "My wife, Rachel, and I will absolutely continue to give whole-hearted support to Ohio Christian University and the students who made our limited time there so rewarding for us. Without the wonderful students we have and our great God, none of this would have been possible." He concludes, "I want to thank all of the staff and my fellow professors who have welcomed me, held my hand, and made my time at OCU one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. I also want to thank all of the students who have shown such grace and friendship to my wife and me."



The State of Emergency Management Higher Education is Good!

Ohio Christian University's Disaster Management and Relief program is one of only 140 programs in the country.



When asked about the offerings, OCU Disaster Management student Jay Allen stated, "There was something offered for everyone, and I don't think anyone walked away from the week wishing they had heard something that was not addressed."

One session was particularly interesting, The State of Emergency Management Higher Education. Each year a survey is conducted by FEMA Higher Education. The survey is given to all programs within the United States offering an Emergency Management program. The end result is a thorough look at Emergency Management as an academic discipline.

There are currently just over 140 college and university programs in the United States offering Emergency Management. There were only 4 programs in the United States in 1994. This massive amount of growth has not slowed. According to B. Wayne Blanchard, Ph.D., CEM, of the Emergency Management Institute, there have been new Emergency Management programs beginning each year since 1994.

This growth is demonstrated in Ohio Christian University's program. When OCU began its program in January 2010, there were 6 students in the program. This fall there are almost 50 students enrolled. According to OCU's Disaster Management Director, Thad Hicks, "The growth in these programs was required to keep in line with the changes in the job market." Hicks added, "The field is now requiring a college education in addition to the traditional certifications and field experience."

Ohio Christian University is a relative newcomer to the field but is learning quickly what it takes to produce leaders in Emergency and Disaster Management. OCU's administration plans to remain at the front in the Emergency Management field. Numerous options are currently being considered to cater to the individual needs of specific areas in the field. In addition, the idea of offering OCU's distinctive courses online is being researched in order to make the program accessible to people all over the world.

FEMA Higher Education might refer to the state of Emergency Management Higher Education as "good." At Ohio Christian University, we say, "The State of Emergency Management Higher Education is Great!"





Disaster Management Student Begins Work With the Conflict Analysis and Intervention Group (CAAIG)

OCU Disaster Management student, Christy Galvan, has received an internship position with The Conflict Analysis and Intervention Group (CAAIG), a U.S.-based company with a Middle East North Africa (MENA) focus. Its mission is to transform conflict and manage emergencies through in-depth assessments and targeted interventions, curriculum design, capacity building, and cross-cultural engagement.

Christy's work with CAAIG will be research based and consist of collecting the "best practices" of faith based organizations in the area of relief management. This area is vital to the field as little research exists. CAAIG MENA Region Coordinator, Marie-Jose Tayah, expressed excitement concerning Christy's addition, stating, "I am very impressed with Christy and her abilities, and very eager to get her started."

Ms. Galvan is a senior majoring in Disaster Management & Relief and is a founding member of the International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) chapter at OCU. In addition, Christy is a member of Epsilon Pi Phi, an Emergency Management Honor Society. Christy is leaving all her doors open, but once graduated; Christy plans to work in International Development.




Thad Hicks Presents Workshop at the Makhzoumi Foundation in Lebanon

On June 24th, Professor Hicks presented at the Makhzoumi Foundation, a private Lebanese nonprofit organization, established in 1997 by Fouad Makhzoumi. The foundation contributes through its programs to the civil society development by providing its services to men, women, and children throughout Lebanon. Healthcare is one of the major areas or need. Doctors, nurses, and staff at the Foundation are working towards preventative treatments and better medical care for the people of Lebanon. This work takes its toll on the providers and some choose to leave the work entirely.

Professor Hicks trained healthcare providers in the area of trauma and responder compassion fatigue. Hicks added, "Those working in the healthcare field are especially susceptible to these issues." This training is particularly timely due to the recent flow of refugees into Lebanon from Syria. These refugees often arrive with medical as well as traumatic issues that need immediate care.



avid Platt, in his best selling book, Radical:
Taking Back Your Faith From The American
Dream, asks some very searching questions to
the American Church and to American believers. He
poses the question of what would happen in our lives
if we really took the Word of God seriously and sought
to live out the gospel of Christ in our fallen world.

At the conclusion of his book he invites us, as American Christians, to join him in a journey of reaching out to the entire world. He makes an astounding statement when he said, "When Jesus looked at the harassed and helpless multitudes, apparently his concern was not that the lost world would not come to the Father. Instead his concern was that his followers would not go to the lost."

I have come to the inescapable conclusion that one of the great privileges an authentic Christ follower has been given is to make Jesus known to all peoples of the earth. The process by which I have come to believe that this best takes place is when we come to the place of understanding the power of one.

The power of one is simply an effort to say that one individual can make an eternal difference by his or her one and only life which is totally yielded to God to be used as He sees best.

There are two powerful events that impacted my life as I began to think about how best to live out the power of one in a global context.

The first was in a banquet room in Atlanta, Georgia in 2002. About 200 people had gathered to hear John Maxwell cast a vision for training a million leaders globally for the cause of Christ. The vision captured my heart and I committed to be a part of this great work with EQUIP Ministries.

From a humble beginning of less than 200 people, God has touched millions of leaders across the globe and expanded the kingdom of God in ways that only will be revealed in eternity.

I have had the privilege of being a part of the EQUIP Leadership Training in the nation of Argentina for the last 3 years. My wife, my son in law, Jason Dooley, and I have traveled to Buenos Aires 6 times over the last 3 years.

It has been one of the great experiences of my life to partner with EQUIP to raise up leaders who will carry the gospel to all of Argentina and even to all of South America.

The second powerful event in my life occurred in December of 2010. My dear friend and long time associate, John Cooper, was taken from us suddenly without warning by an aggressive form of cancer. His passing made a lasting impact on my life and on the lives of those who make up the Brookside Church. Out of this difficult experience, God has taught us what a difference one person can make in the lives of others. The power of one is no longer just a phrase or catchy motto in our lives. It has become a driving force in all we are trying to do in living out our faith in a fallen world.

In March of 2011 my wife and I were extended an invitation to travel with Dr. Doug and Winnie Carter to the nation of China. We spent time with Chinese Christians and saw first-hand what God was doing in this expansive nation. When asked by one of the leaders, "What will you speak to us about?" I responded somewhat sheepishly, "The power of one."

He began to weep and said that it was "divine"! He shared with me that he believed that the secret to reaching out to His people with the gospel was simply one person who was committed to sharing his faith with another and then building into another life until that person grows into a strong believer who will repeat the process over and over again.



Since our trip to China I have had the privilege of traveling again to Argentina with OCU President, Dr. Mark Smith and District Superintendent, Rev. Mike Holbrook to speak to a gathering of South American Nazarene leaders about the power of one. It was a marvelous experience to see hundreds of leaders gather to hear about the power of one. It is bringing power and renewal to every life who takes it seriously.

Over the last several years, God has taken me to places that I would have never dreamed possible...Brazil, Bolivia, Ukraine, Africa and Argentina... but it has been the deepest joy I have ever known.

Perhaps, we need to take the Radical challenge and seek to live out our lives by giving ourselves to the work of raising up strong Christian leaders and Christ Followers who are committed to The Power of One and to reaching our world for Christ.

It is a challenge that we will never regret...in time or in eternity! Why worry about all of this? The answer is quite simple: because Lost People Matter To God!

Jonah Mitchell and I (both alumni of Ohio Christian University) joined EQUIP as associate trainers to be able to fulfill Act 1:8 and become God's witnesses not only across the street but around the world. EOUIP is a ministry that has worked hard in enlisting others to join in leadership development overseas so that the Gospel could go forward in the power of he Holy Spirit through well trained leaders. Jonah and I therefore joined **EQUIP** by becoming Associate Trainers and took on the challenge to teach Leadership and Ministry to pastors and church leaders in Honduras.

We are committed to go to Tegucigalpa, Honduras twice a year for three years. During these times of leadership training we spend several days teaching and spending time with the Honduran pastors and church leaders. There are around 150 to 200 who attend each session and they are so passionate to learn and develop in leadership as well as the things of God and ministry. Jonah and I teach a notebook of six lessons each time we go and in the three year time frame will have the opportunity to teach six notebooks.

The 120-yard by 75-yard field has been shaped properly to provide a nice, flat playing surface for intercollegiate games. The soccer teams, under the direction of Coach Josh Murton, are excited for this new development.

Trailblazer Athletics has also announced the formation of a Men's and Women's Cross Country program. This is an exciting addition to the athletic program. The Trailblazers were able to find strong leadership to guide the runners in former high school cross country coach Jim Diltz and former high school runner Scott Boyer.

Diltz coached 35 years in Circleville, leading the Tigers to a 389-46 record and six top-10 team finishes at the state level. His philosophy of the team as a family that cares for and helps one another will be the cornerstone of the OCU cross country program. To that end he emphasizes that his athletes work hard and are good representatives of themselves, their families, and the university. Coach Diltz also serves the campus community as an adjunct professor in the education department at OCU.

Boyer, a recruiter for Ohio Christian University's adult degree programs, started his cross country career as a standout runner at Defiance High School in Defiance, Ohio. He is a graduate of Mount Vernon Nazarene University, which did not have a cross country program during Scott's time there. Boyer he continued running and training on his own and completed his first Columbus Half-Marathon in October of 2010. He continues to run and train for distance races.

Academic Dean Granted Sabbatical for Fall Semester




