#### Academic Enhancements

- Faculty began monthly academic presentations for the campus community.
- Dr. Krista Stonerock was selected to serve on the McGraw Hill Freshmen Composition Symposium.
- Dr. Sylvia McDonald and OCU senior Jodi Irvine presented research on hybrid learning at the National Institute for the Teaching of Psychology.
- Dr. David Garrison led groups of students to New York City and Washington, D.C., adding real-world experience to their academic studies.
- Bible faculty were trained in the Holy Land.
- Math and Science concentrations were approved for the Teacher Education program, and OCU student teachers participated in field testing for the Stanford University-based Teacher Performance Assessment.

New minors and concentrations include Children's Ministry, Intercultural Ministry, Pastoral Care and Counseling, Worship Leadership, and Youth Ministry. Dual major programs include Government & Public Service/Business, Disaster Management & Relief/Business, and Sports Management/Business.

### Spiritual Development

Fifty-six percent of students self-reported in a survey that they have surrendered themselves to the Lordship of Christ while on this campus. Fourteen percent report they have become Christians while at OCU, and 70% report growing spiritually this year. This is the greatest report we could have!

### OCU Wins First National Championship

The men's basketball team, led by Coach Tony Stockman, earned OCU's first national title in any sport. The men's soccer, baseball, women's basketball, and volleyball teams also competed for national titles. OCU hosted the 2013 NCCAA Women's Basketball National Tournament, which contributed nearly 300 pounds of food for the CCCU City Mission.





#### Faith in Action

OCU continues to cultivate servant leaders to serve the church and the world. Christian service activities included nursing home visits, assisting veterans, volunteering at churches and local schools, and ministering to the homeless. Nearly 450 participants volunteered for the 2013 Community Action Day.

Our Church Relations department, led by Tony and Abby McCrary, continues to serve

the church through traveling student ministries. The OCU Chorale and music groups, Ablaze and Sounds of Hope, ministered at more than 60 events this year and received many compliments from their hosts.

### **Enrollment Surpassed 3,000**

The university continues to experience enrollment growth across all programs, with pronounced growth in its online offerings. A large proportion of students are seeking to enroll at OCU for ministry training, and 1,200 current students are enrolled in ministry programs.

### **Campus Updates**

The recently completed Dean and Diana Hickman Student Center has been a blessing to the campus and surrounding community. Many visitors are coming to campus for lunch and to shop in The Connection, the new Christian bookstore. Dr. and Mrs. Joshua Fischer provided a significant gift which allowed us to purchase a new bus, and Dr. and Mrs. Lyle Reed sponsored a new Disaster Management vehicle. We thank God daily for all who support OCU financially and through prayer.

### CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT through Teaching





Our faculty serve as mentors and attempt to disciple students in addition to teaching them academic content.

As part of the development of its Conceptual Framework, OCU decided that character development was important to the holistic development of its students to serve the church and society. Our faculty demonstrate Christian character traits to serve as visible examples. However, faculty also attempt to impart character development through intentional instruction methods. Here are examples of ways faculty are accomplishing this.

**Diligence** – General Psychology: Two groups of students were presented different "research findings," but both sides stated they were not surprised at the finding, even though the findings were the exact opposite of each other. This illustrates our need to be diligent in pursuing truth.

**Faithfulness** - Financial Management: Students discuss the function of the financial manager within the firm. Financial indiscretions and putting financial considerations ahead of ethical conduct have been the downfall of many companies and individuals. An ethical foundation of faithfulness will pay real dividends in the long run.

**Gentleness** - Individual Chemical Dependency Counseling: Students discuss the issue of spirituality in relationship to chemical dependency counseling, including the tensions between a Christian worldview and those common to treatment and how the Christian counselor conducts him/herself in a secular environment.

**Joy** - Principles of Worship: Students discuss various means of worship, including prayer, music, the Word, and the sacraments, which bring joy through true worship.

**Love** – Fine Arts Appreciation: After reading I Corinthians 13, students identify which character in a specific opera demonstrated the most love and defend their selection.

**Patience** – Teaching Math Methods: Using the example of how Jesus treated children, students discuss how this is relevant to their view of their students.

**Respect** - Introduction to Sociology: Students develop their Christian worldview related to self in society. They focus on understanding that we are taught arrogance through ethnocentrism, but Christ calls us to see each person as God's wonderful, beautiful creation, worthy of respect.

**Self-control** - College Study Skills: Students get a realistic view of the expectations of college and the role that they play in their own success. Students complete a time management worksheet to analyze where they are spending their time and how to adjust according to the new priority of college work.

### CHARACTER through Psychology | MATT DECKER

For those interested in human behavior, character is a complicated topic to study. One cannot see or hear character. Thus, it is difficult to discuss objectively. From my point of view, character is about the thousands of decisions each of us make daily and the patterns of action formed by those choices.

The rapidly changing landscape of the world means there are choices that our students will have to make in the future that we, as educators, cannot foresee or—in some cases—even understand. Therefore,

giving a student a list of rules is inadequate because it cannot completely prepare the student for what may come. Choices related to peer pressure and political correctness are common examples of how each of us can be influenced by society. We may not know exactly how these issues will be presented to students in the future, but we can equip them with a foundation of biblical values on which to base their views.

At OCU, we teach students how to intentionally apply biblical principles to each decision they make. Allowing students to work through the mental processes of decision making, while providing guidance based on a Christian worldview is one way we are training the future generation of leaders to tackle problems with innovation and creativity grounded in Christian values.

### CHARACTER through Composition | KRISTA STONEROCK

Since almost all incoming students take a two-semester sequence of English Composition in their first year, we intentionally incorporate the university's selected character traits in a brief, student-led presentation for each class period. Students present a devotional, along with a vocabulary word and writing prompt. This year, the devotional themes were based on the following character traits: patience, faithfulness, self-control, diligence, generosity, and respect.

Student Joel Kirkwood, drawing on the theme of faithfulness, shared a devotional based on Matthew 4:19-20. Joel spoke about the faithfulness of the disciples, who immediately dropped their nets to follow Jesus, and challenged his classmates, "What are you continuing to carry in your nets? What's dragging you down? Is it worth it?" He talked about the joy of releasing those weights and responding in faithfulness.

As we approached midterm week, student Joshua Harshbarger shared a devotional from Isaiah 40:28-31. He shared with the class his amazement that "the God who created the whole universe and everything in it would care to sustain us." Hoping the passage would encourage those who were feeling tired at such a busy time of the semester, he reminded the class of the importance of diligence and the truth that "God gives us strength when we don't feel like we can gather enough strength to carry on."



# Josias Rodriguez 1993-2013

The OCU community was deeply impacted by the sudden loss of Josias Noel Roderiguez, a 19-year-old sophomore in the traditional program. Josias was a graduate of Tree of Life Christian High School and was known as a shining example of Christian character.

Family and friends gathered in a memorial service at OCU on April 29th, sharing memories and planting a memorial tree on campus. Josias's mother, Judy Rodriguez, encouraged students, saying, "You have a purpose and a destiny to fulfill in Christ. Don't waste it." A candlelight vigil, during which friends recounted their experiences with Josias, was held that night.

Josias was a man after God's own heart and an incredible friend to many on campus. Though he was well-liked and voted a class favorite and homecoming king, Josias was always focused on God and others.

Christ lived in Josias Rodriguez. Josias's pores oozed Christ's love. His spirit oozed God's grace and kindness.

As described by Rev. Aaron Duvall, "Josias was a breath of fresh air. He was a light in a dark world."

Dr. Krista Stonerock stated, "Christ lived in Josias Rodriguez. Josias's pores oozed Christ's love. His spirit oozed God's grace and

kindness for not only his friends, but also for the "least of these," as evidenced by his recent mission trip to Trinidad and many Saturday afternoons spent at Pickaway Manor nursing home, playing games and visiting with the residents there."

Earlier this year, Josias wrote, "Throughout life, no matter what happens, one thing that never changes and we can always stand on is the fact that God is good. He loves us and will never forsake us."

### OCU Graduates Record 474 New Alumni



OCU conducted its 63rd commencement on Saturday, May 4, with a record graduation of 474 students. Last year, 396 students were graduated.

Sixty-one of the 474 graduates are from the traditional program, which consists primarily of semester long classes, taught in the day. The other graduates participated in the adult and graduate studies program, which features accelerated classes one night each week or online. The average age of the students graduating from the traditional program was 24 with a range of 20 to 41. The average age of the students graduating from the adult program was 39 with a range of 21 to 73.

Daniel Kuhn of Winfield, West Virginia, was the valedictorian and the honor graduate for the traditional program. The honor graduate for the adult and graduate studies program was Sandy Ott of Ashland, Kentucky Linette Shetler of Plain City, Ohio, and Jermaine Wilson of Indianapolis, Indiana, were the co-salutatorians.

The commencement speaker was the honorable J. C. Watts, Jr., former U.S. Congressman for eight years, former quarterback of the University of Oklahoma who led them to two Big Eight championships and two Orange Bowl victories, former Canadian football quarterback, ordained minister, and current CEO of Watts Companies, a consulting firm.

OCU recognized Watts for his life of distinguished Christian service by awarding him a Doctorate of Christian Leadership. OCU President Mark Smith said, "OCU is extremely fortunate to attract a speaker as distinguished as J. C. Watts!"

According to a Barna Group study, Christians age 23-41 are only "somewhat less likely" than non-Christians to view pornography on the Internet. This report provides a clear message: something must change! The change must start with Christians choosing to live holy lives. God changes lives! Sanctification is the work of the Holy Spirit. As John Wesley reminded us, the

NCCAA National Championship on
March 9, 2013, with a 73-62 win over
Arlington Baptist University. The championship capped off a perfect season in
which the Trailblazers went undefeated
in 22 games in NCCAA Division II.

Upon their return to Circleville, the team was greeted with a police escort to a gathering of OCU fans, staff, and supporters. The team was featured on Wall to Wall Sports with Dom Tiberi of WBNS-10TV in Columbus, and the local community celebrated with a special parade featuring the Circleville High School band. County Commissioners and Mayor, Don McIlroy, proclaimed March 19th Ohio Christian University 2013 National Championship Day.

"This is a special time for our community," said Dr. Mark Smith, president of OCU. "Not one of these guys could have delivered it on his own," he said. "It took all of them, with outstanding coaching from Tony Stockman and Jamey Batten."

"I have to give credit to the players," commented OCU head coach Tony Stockman. "They have worked really hard and all of that hard work paid off. It was a process. Our guys committed to sacrifice individual goals for team goals, and that made all the difference down the stretch. The team became a family, and that was a key element in our success."



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### Dean and Diana Hickman Student Center Dedication

Ohio Christian University conducted a dedication ceremony for the 30,000 square foot, \$6 million Dean and Diana Hickman Student Center on March 23rd. The building includes a cafeteria, café, bookstore, intramural gym space, game room, classrooms, and offices. The building was needed to support the rapidly growing student body at OCU.

The building is named for Dean and Diana Hickman, who gave a significant gift to the university. Dean is President of Paragon Technical Services and has sung tenor with the Guardian Quartet since their first concert in 1988.

### We desire to help OCU students pursue their God-given dreams.

The Hickmans spoke at the ceremony about the need for Christian higher education and thanked OCU for its good work in this area. Also speaking at the ceremony were Circleville Mayor Don McIlroy and Pickaway County Economic Development Director Ryan Scribner. "I can't

wait to see what is next at OCU," they both said. Pickaway County Chamber of Commerce President Amy Elsea also assisted with the ribbon cutting ceremony.

OCU President Mark Smith said, "Dean and Diana have been good friends of Ohio Christian University. It was reasonable to name our new student center in honor of them." This building adjoins the Maxwell Center and the Science and Logistics Center, which are used by thousands of community members every year.

That little boy was my answer; I had met Jesus in an orphanage. I believe Jesus met me where He had led me. God has given me a desire to love and care for abandoned, neglected, and hurting children. The next step of my journey is learning where God wants me.


