Recently the Board of Trustees allowed me a time for recreation, rest, and rejuvenation. During that month, I was greatly impacted by the book of Joshua and began to think about the vision of OCU for the next five years. As I studied, God gave me this verse as a promise:

While on the trip I also read *The Circle Maker* and was challenged to pray for a larger circle of influence. At the conclusion of that planning process, I met with the OCU Administrative team to develop vision.

As we planned, our prayer was for God to guide us in vision and planning. We sense that we are called to educate men and women of integrity to live, share, preach, and teach biblical truth in a generation that needs to see the love of Christ. In essence, we desire to create an Ohio Christian University education that prepares this generation for societal impact through biblical truth and service.

- 7. Who would you recommend to work at OCU? Why?


The opportunity for OCU to increase its positive impact in the community, through *3 vital initiatives,* has never been more clear:




Hands on rity Garden project this

Record Enrollment! 380 to 3,800 since 2005



Ohio Christian University has once again broken its previous enrollment record, topping more than 3,800 students. Enrollment has grown by about 19 percent, according to Dr. Hank Kelly, OCU Provost. That number includes more than 850 students on campus and more than 2,900 in the College of Adult & Graduate Studies.

Kelly credits the increase in residential enrollment to campus enhancements. "Our student center just opened last November, and the campus now has a 'wow factor' that it didn't have before," Kelly said. The university's Welcome Center was converted to a residence hall to provide housing for additional students. The continued growth has prompted OCU to plan campus additions such as a Performing Arts Center, to alleviate the need for multiple chapel services. The College of Adult and Graduate Studies continues to attract adult students seeking to complete their education. New programs, such as the Bachelor of Arts in Disaster Management and Bachelor of Science in Nursing (RN to BSN) have been added to prepare students for in-demand careers. In addition to new programs, the College of Adult and Graduate Studies continues to offer its degree completion program in new geographic regions and online.

Providing more opportunities for Christian education in the greater Atlanta area is the reason Dr. Malon Mimms gifted the building at 1550 Southlake Parkway in Morrow, GA, pictured below, to Ohio Christian University. This fall that vision becomes reality as the university begins offering undergraduate and graduate degree programs in Morrow.

OCU is also pleased to announce the hire of Dr. Shawn Thomas as Director of Enrollment and Operations and

Ms. Latonya Holmes as Corporate Developer and Recruiter. Ms. Holmes has an extensive background in recruitment and will work to build strong relationships with organizations and students. 


GREAT BEGINNINGS

Biblical Marriage is Beautiful

stand for traditional marriage (one man-one woman for life). I love marriage with my beautiful wife of 27 years and my two adopted sons who come from diverse settings. What a privilege to enjoy this God-designed institution. The traditional family unit has made America great and brings so much peace to life. As the Supreme Court debated the merits of same sex marriage, many of our elected officials on both sides of the aisle rendered comments in support of or opposition to same sex marriage, sending news-breaking statements across the nation as both political pundits and peasant commoners discussed the implications. While I use caution when remarking about the actions of others, I have and always will support biblical foundational principles. This article is not about a person. It is about family-centered biblical principles.

Current society finds many citizens deciding critical issues based on polls or humanistic thinking which views humans as the decision makers or as "gods" of their own lives. I, in turn, take a biblical view of worshiping the Lord God, and this shapes my particular beliefs or value system. For many years, the biblical view has been the foundational tenet of America and is connected to why I believe we have been so blessed as a nation. Psalms 33:12 reminds us, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD, the people he chose for his inheritance" (NIV). America's embrace of a monotheistic view of God has been essential in structuring the moral fabric of society for over two hundred years. Today, not only has this view of God been attacked and discredited, but self has been elevated to "god" as the great moral authority. Because of this self-centered reasoning about God, now viewpoints on truth and especially biblical truth are changing with regard to issues like marriage. After all, humanity knows better–humanity is "god." But the question before us is "should we build a culture around polls and our own humanistic thinking?"

America has been great because of its reliance on a Supreme God, its honoring of biblical principles that support right living, and because of God's blessing. We may choose to deny biblical truth but must acknowledge certain principles for daily living have been established for our own protection, and marriage is created for this purpose. Here are some truths from scripture:

- Male and female are God's creation for purposes of his glory.
- Marriage is ordained of God to protect our lives, give peace, and multiply the earth.
- ¤ God forbids sexual sins of all types.
- The family is the societal fabric upon which cultures are built.

From a biblical perspective, it is evident God ordained a beautiful life for all to enjoy. Through sin, that perfect life was destroyed and replaced by chaos.

I believe in God's original design for marriage, and I call for America to embrace the beauty of the family.

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The only way to have a restored life is to experience the forgiving grace of our loving Savior and allow the Holy Spirit to cleanse the heart of sin.

Additionally, the American culture of success has been built around a traditional family society. The destruction of many civilizations has followed the corruption of the family unit through sexual sins and inappropriate relationships. From a sociological point of view, Pitirim Sorokin, Harvard founding sociologist, suggests that civilization is only possible when marriage is normative and mother and father accept responsibility for their offspring. Humankind, left to its own devices, is quite adept at destroying culture. Do we Americans understand that our society is doomed for disaster by embracing a culture that destroys the traditional family unit?

From another angle, the pure economics of a societal breakdown are staggering. As the meaning of the traditional family unit (one man, one woman, with children) disintegrates, so will social services need to be increased, costing millions to society. Multiple studies show how children need the established family unit, and that when it breaks down, there are negative consequences. Children become confused, requiring additional counseling services, healthcare services, and medications. Families struggle economically when a mother and father are not present to provide their roles of love and protection for the family unit. History reveals that the impact is devastating to economic realities.

Scholars David Popenoe and Barbara Whitehead are on target when sharing, "Marriage is a fundamental social institution – the 'social glue' that reliably attaches fathers and mothers to their children. It contributes to the physical, emotional, and economic health of men, women, and children, and thus to the nation as a whole. It is also one of the most highly prized of all human relationships and a central life goal of most Americans."

I believe in God's original design for marriage, and I call for America to embrace the beauty of the family. Timothy Keener, in *The Meaning of Marriage*, said, "Marriage is glorious, but hard. It is a burning joy and strength, and yet it is also blood, sweat, and tears, humbling defeats, and exhausting victories ... there is no relationship between beings that is greater or more important than marriage." It is useless to be malicious toward those who oppose this viewpoint, but it is imperative to remain bold while refusing to bow to those who desire to destroy the intrinsic human beauty of biblical American culture.

I believe in the beauty of life created with intentionality, and firmly embrace God's love which reaches all humankind. I love every man and woman, and I am convinced life will be full of joy and peace when God, not self, is God. Again, I love marriage.

Fall Revival

OCU's Fall Revival featured special guest evangelist, Rev. Susie Shellenberger. Rev. Shellenberger created and edited *Brio*, a Focus on the Family publication, for 19 years. She also co-hosted a national weekly call-in radio show for teens called "Life on the Edge Live" that was produced by Focus on the Family for a number of years. Rev. Shellenberger has written over 40 books, as well as being the editor and namesake of the magazine SUSIE.

Rev. Shellenberger is an ordained minister in the Church of the Nazarene. Shellenberger has debated Dr. Ruth Westheimer on Fox News Channel and been featured as a teen expert on The Montel Williams Show. Additionally, she has taken more than 5,000 teens on mission trips around the world. Olivet Nazarene University named her "Woman of the Century" in 2000 and awarded her with its Lifetime Achievement Award in 2010.

This series of revival services has helped to set the spiritual tone for campus life here at OCU. Monday brought the beginning of teaching English to the Thai and Chinese people. God was evidently with us. My favorite part of the trip was the weekly visits to Gethsemane Home, a children's home in the hills of Northern Thailand. These children aren't orphans. Their parents either couldn't take care of them, or didn't want to take care of them. These children were full of joy, even when they didn't understand the English we were trying to teach. These children, and their attitude, their unmistakable joy, moved me a great deal. God tells us to be like the little children, and they are who I want to be like when I grow up. God gave us just what we could handle and I can only hope that His light was evident. God is in everything and is everywhere all around us. We don't see it sometimes because our focus isn't on Him. His joy is something I will always remember from our trip.

College Credit for High School

What does "PSEO" mean, and is it for me?

I always say that I have a unique perspective of Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) for high school students. Why? As a parent, I understand the nerves associated with sending my high school student to a college campus to take courses. However, I also understand the tremendous benefit of him getting college credit for free while still in high school. Frankly, it's a load off my mind to know that this will save me a large sum of money as college tuition continues to climb. My son is able to see what a college course looks like, what professors expect, and the work it will take to succeed in college. And, it doesn't cost me a dime. He started when he was a freshman and is currently on track to graduate with an Associate's Degree from OCU *before* graduating from high school.



I'm also a professor at OCU, teaching about 250 students each semester, most of whom are freshmen. I know each one by name. I know their academic gifts and struggles. I see them in the middle of the challenging transition between high school and college. It's a difficult time for many of them as they're experiencing freedom from their parents for the first time, establishing new relationships, leaving old familiarity, and being shocked by the change in academic expectations.

In contrast, I observe PSEO students easing into this academic transition with the invaluable benefit of still being at home. My PSEO students are usually my best students. Is it because they're more academically gifted? No. It's because they are still living at home and aren't taking the same heavy academic load as the average college freshman. They have their family support system and high school peers to keep their routines

normal. Instead of experiencing many transitions at once, PSEO students are introduced to college academic expectations while other areas of their lives are stable. From my professional perspective, they have a much smoother transition than many first-year college students.

Finally, I have the perspective of being the PSEO Director at OCU. Enrollment has grown from fewer than 20 students in 2008 to more than 400 today. The impressive growth is the result of students sharing this tremendous opportunity with their friends. More students are realizing they qualify, and more parents are recognizing the enormous potential for savings.

Local high schools have begun partnering with OCU to offer PSEO courses on their campuses. Circleville, Amanda, and Teays Valley offer PSEO courses during their regular school day, enabling students to take college courses for college credit without ever leaving their own school. We also offer online courses allowing students to earn college credit from home, with the added benefit of a flexible schedule.

While there are some guidelines, most students are eligible to enroll beginning in their freshman year of high school. Find out if your student is eligible by visiting our website or calling today.

Senator Brown Promotes and Assists with Southern Gateway Economic Innovation Development Center

Nearly two-thirds of new jobs are created at small businesses. But in today's tough economic climate, small businesses are struggling to get the resources they need to get off the ground.

Last week, the Circleville Herald reported on a promising effort that could help small businesses create jobs in Pickaway County ("Business Incubator Under Discussion in County," Jan. 26). The Herald covered a meeting held at Ohio Christian University (OCU) with community leaders and the Pickaway Progress Partnership (P3) to discuss a possible partnership with TechColumbus that would lead to the development of a business incubator at OCU.

We all know that small businesses are engines of economic growth - creating 64 percent of new jobs nationwide. I was proud to vote for the bipartisan Small Business Jobs Act, which has helped unfreeze the credit market for small businesses. But access to credit is only one of many hurdles that small businesses must overcome, and that's why business incubators are so important.

Business incubators equip entrepreneurs with the tools they need to excel. By sharing resources office space, and overhead costs, business incubators reduce the risk of small business failures. According to the Ohio-based National Business Incubator Association, 87 percent of all firms that have completed business incubator training are still in business.

Ohio is home to approximately 30 business incubators, which are helping to create new jobs and build new, regional industries. According to a 2008 independent report commissioned by the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA), for every \$10,000 in EDA funds invested in business incubators, between 47 and 69 local jobs are created.

I've authored the Business Incubator Promotion Act, which would support and create business incubators in hard-hit regions of Ohio and the country. The bill would do two things. First, it would provide resources to help regions introduce new business incubators and expand existing ones. Such incubator support has already created hundreds of thousands of jobs by providing start-up companies with support services to help turn innovative ideas into viable businesses.

Second, the bill would help ensure that economically-distressed communities have access to federal resources through the EDA. By targeting resources to areas suffering from severe economic hardship and high unemployment rates, we could help create higher-skill, higher-wage jobs that put Ohio's products and services into the global marketplace.

If we want to promote an economy fueled by innovation, we must better connect our entrepreneurs with the resources they need to transform an idea in a lab into a product on the market. TechColumbus has a strong track record of innovation in central Ohio. By utilizing homegrown talent in Pickaway County, OCU, and P3, we can strengthen create jobs and build Ohio businesses.

Small businesses are critical to rejuvenating the job market in our state. Supporting small, locally-owned companies can help support Ohio communities - and help put people in Pickaway County back to work.

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














Men's Soccer Looks to Continue Dominance

Alumnus Dave Gray Excels in Leading Local Youth

After serving 12 years as the Youth Pastor for the Circleville Nazarene Church, Dave Gray is often asked one question.

"People are always wondering when I'm going to step up and become a senior pastor. To me, I feel like I'm on the front lines," Gray said. "It's very exciting to be in youth ministry because that's when kids are making faith decisions."

When Gray first started at "The Naz," he was newly married to Becky, and there were 12 teens involved in the youth group. Both Gray's family and youth group has grown. He now has a daughter (7 years), son (18 months), and the youth group consists of 100.

The growth in numbers has been a blessing, but Gray is more concerned with seeing the teens find their identity in Christ. "Things began to really increase as teenagers began falling in love with Jesus! Their passion for Him was contagious," Gray said.

When Gray was a young adult, he struggled to find God's vision for his life. It was at an OCU chapel service when he really felt the call to serve the Lord and his people. He graduated in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in Christian Ministry. His advice for those going into his field is simple. "No ministry preparation program can compare to giving God a pure heart and loving others because of that," Gray said.

Going forward, Gray's not looking for worldly accomplishments or a fancy title. He simply wants to continue to bear good fruit. "I always try to compare myself to the tree that Zacchaeus climbed. I want to be able to lift kids up so they can see Christ."
